





# **SITE REQUIREMENTS**

A firm, level, and a relatively smooth floor, with the services brought to the appliance. A minimum of 12 mm ( $\frac{1}{2}$  in) clearance is required each side of the appliance to permit removal for servicing.


# **UNPACKING & INSTALLATION**

- Remove the carton, loose packing and plastic bag.
- Unscrew the 4 x 10 mm screws 'A' indicated in the diagram, which fix the 2 red brackets.
- Rotate the left hand side red bracket 'B' a ¼ turn to the left and then withdraw the attached transit bar completely from the machine.

- Rotate the right hand side red bracket 'C' a ¼ turn to the right and then withdraw the attached transit bar completely from the machine.
- Cover the holes left in the rear of the machine with two plastics cover plates (supplied with your machine) using the transit bar fixing screws.

Note: It is advisable to keep these transit bars for possible future use (see page 15).

6. Remove the fill hoses from the drum and the sealing washers from the accessory bag. For connection see page 5.

# WARNING THIS APPLIANCE MUST BE EARTHED

If this appliance is fitted with a non-rewireable plug for which your socket is unsuitable then it should be cut off and an appropriate plug fitted. The removed plug should be disposed of as insertion of the plug into a13 A socket is likely to cause an electrical hazard. If it is necessary to change the fuse in a non-rewireable plug the fuse cover must be refitted. If the fuse cover is lost or damaged the plug must not be used until a replacement is obtained. Replacement fuse covers are available from THORN EMI Domestic Appliances Ltd., Service Division, Limberline Road, Hilsea, Portsmouth, Hants. Tel: 0705 664466. It is important that the colour of the replacement fuse cover corresponds with the colour marking on the base of the plug.

**IMPORTANT**- The wires in the mains lead are coloured in accordance with the following code:

GREEN AND YELLOW EARTH
BLUE NEUTRAL
BROWN LIVE

As the colours of the wires in the mains lead of this appliance may not correspond with the colour markings identifying the terminals in your plug proceed as follows:

The wire which is coloured green and yellow must be connected to the terminal which is marked with the letter 'E' or by the 'Earth' symbol  $\pm$  or coloured green or coloured green and yellow.

The wire which is coloured blue must be connected to the terminal which is marked with the letter 'N' or coloured black. The wire which is coloured brown must be connected to the terminal which is marked with the letter 'L' or coloured red.

The appliance must be protected by a 13 A ASTA approved (BS1362) fuse if a 13 A (BS1363) plug or a non-rewireable plug is used. If any other type of plug is fitted, a 15 A fuse must be used either in the plug or adaptor or at the distribution board.

This appliance complies with European Economic Community Radio Interference Directive 82/499/E.E.C.



The diagram shows a typical domestic plumbing system. Connections can be made by fitting teepieces in the existing pipework. Before using the new pipework for the first time flush out swarf and flux.

Permanent connections to Bendix stopcocks located at the side of the appliance to permit moving it for servicing.

It is advisable before connecting your machine to the water supply, to ensure that the drain screen located at the front of the machine is fully tightened (see page 8).


# CONNECTING THE INLET WATER SUPPLY

Connect the inlet hoses, making sure the sealing washers supplied are fitted to each end of both hot and cold water hoses.

Where necessary the appliance can be used on cold-only water supply by connecting both water inlets by means of a Bendix Y-connector 479598.

A standpipe is recommended, with the dimensions shown. If the appliance is to be left connected to the plumbing and drainage, the drain hose may be reduced in length to suit the installation.

Permanent drainage arrangements should conform to the dimensions given. There must be an airbreak or the appliance may syphon.


The dimensions given in these instructions are not intended to be direct conversions between metric and imperial units. Please work in one set only.

# **CONNECTING THE DRAINAGE**

To ensure a secure installation when using a standpipe or similar outlet the moulded U-former should be used.

The U-former should be snapped onto the drain hose near the end of the hose at a suitable point. The sketch shows a useful arrangement.

Alternatively the hose may be hooked over the edge of a sink.



Most Important: Make sure all hoses are not kinked or the machine will not operate.

# Instantaneous Water Heaters

This model is suitable for use with some makes of instantaneous gas water-heaters. Full details of compatible water-heaters should be obtained from the heater manufacturer or Gas showroom.

The use of these heaters may require more frequent cleaning of the Autowasher water inlet filters than would be necessary with other water heating methods.

### **Bathroom Installations**

This appliance must be installed in accordance with the IEE regulations, in particular with regard to installation in bathrooms; if not we reserve the right to refuse to service it.

# **Plumbing**

The recommendations set out are suggestions only. All installations must comply with the requirements of local authorities or public utilities.

# Adjustable Feet

It is important that the machine is stable and level during operation to help you obtain these conditions, the machine is fitted with adjustable feet. To adjust the feet, loosen the locking nuts and adjust all feet to give a level and stable position and then retighten the locking nuts.

**Note:** If the appliance is to be located on an area which is carpeted, then we recommend the use of a piece of hardboard beneath the machine to help you locate the machine correctly in its final resting position.

### **Transit Bars**

**Most Important:** (As shown in the Unpacking Instruction page 3.)

These must be removed before use. Failure to do so will damage your machine.

# **OPTIONAL EXTRAS**

Bendix stopcocks 24041 (Hot) and 24042 (Cold) and Cold-Fill Y-connector 479598 are available to help with the installation and use of the appliance.

Stacking Kit 28648 for stacking with Bendix tumble dryer model 7448 as vertical pair.

# **Operating Instructions - Know your BENDIX autowasher**

# Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector IMPORTANT: Turn only clockwise.

Rotate clockwise to select the wash programme required. Pull it out to start the machine, push in to stop it. Once set and pulled out the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector rotates and shows how far through the wash programme your machine has progressed.

A useful guide for matching fabrics to wash programme can be seen on the fascia panel and again on page 11.

# **Detergent Dispenser**

The detergent dispenser is designed so that detergents and additives will flush automatically into your machine. It is divided into three compartments "1" for pre-wash or Bio powders, "2" for main wash powders and "3" for additives i.e. fabric softeners such as Comfort. At the end of the wash programme, any remaining water will be automatically syphoned out leaving the dispenser ready for the next wash.

**NOTE:** The detergent dispenser drawer and housing should be periodically cleaned to prevent a build up of detergent and fabric softener. The dispenser drawer is easily removed by pulling as far as it will go, then giving a sharp tug. Rinse the dispenser drawer under the tap, dry and replace by slotting the top of the drawer into the runners on the top of the opening and close in the normal way.

Mains Indicator Light - Glows when power is connected, a programme selected and the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector pulled out.

### **Drain Screen**

The removable drain screen which protects the pump from lint and foreign matter needs to be cleaned periodically. How often will depend on your wash load e.g. cotton towels and nappies cause more lint to collect than nylon loads.

First ensure that your machine is empty, then open the service door to expose screen by pressing on the right hand side.

Unscrew by turning anti clockwise 3 times and pull the drain screen out. Have a cloth or shallow tray under the drain screen housing, as a small quantity of water may run out. You may find it helpful to first set the machine to spin then remove the drain screen. This procedure reduces the amount of water released. Clean the screen under running water to help remove the trapped lint. Replace the screen by turning it clockwise until finger tight. Under no circumstances should the drain screen be removed whilst the machine is full of water.


# **Buttons**

# **Economy**

When this button is pushed in the quantity of water to be heated is reduced. Also less soap powder may be used. This feature is ideal for smaller loads.

# Wool/Quick Wash

- (a) This button pushed in provides a gentle action most suitable for machine washable woollens.
- (b) With button in normal "out" position programme 7 gives a quick 40 minute wash, at 40°C, for less soiled items.



# **Using your BENDIX autowasher**

Always use a low sudsing detergent in your machine, e.g. Persil Automatic, as these are specially formulated to work in conjunction with your Autowasher machine to give the best results.

Initially water enters the machine and flows directly to the drum bypassing the detergent dispenser, preventing waste of detergent into the sump. Detergents will then be flushed automatically into the machine from the detergent dispenser. The suds level should never rise more than halfway up the porthole. Too much foam will not only impede the wash action of your machine but will rise through the detergent dispenser and make a mess on the floor!

If this should happen clear excessive suds by setting the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector to the beginning of the first rinse and allow the machine to rinse out.

The following quantity of powder is a guide for average water supplies. If the water is very hard, more powder may be needed. If very soft, less will be needed. If in doubt refer to the instructions on the packet.

Main Wash 200g (7 oz) Economy Wash 150g (5 oz)

If you have a more heavily soiled load and decide to use the pre-wash before a main wash, use approximately one third of the powder in the pre-wash compartment 'I' of the dispenser and the remaining two thirds in the main wash '2' compartment.

Note: an average teacup holds (3-3 $\frac{1}{2}$  oz) 85-100g.

# Fabric Softeners e.g. Comfort

All fabrics, particularly towels and nappies, benefit from the use of fabric conditioners in the final rinse. Items of laundry feel softer, are more easily ironed and the clinging effect of synthetics is considerably reduced.

# To Use:

Pour the conditioner into the "additives" compartment '3' of the detergent dispenser in accordance with the recommendations on the bottle label (standard conditioner 80 ml).

The conditioner will automatically be injected into the machine during the final rinse. Do not overfill the container as this will cause premature syphoning of the conditioner into the machine.

# **Preparation Before You Wash**

Today many garments carry a label under the International Textile Care Labelling (ITCLC) scheme indicating the correct type of wash treatment required. You will find that this label corresponds to the Wash Chart on Page 11.

Sort your washing according to the Care Label number given on the garment, or if absent, according to the fabric and type of wash treatment required. Your Bendix Autowasher takes up to 4 kg (9 lb) dry weight of cotton clothes.

If you decide for one reason or another to mix fabrics, always use the wash programme for the most delicate fabric in the load. For example a wash load made up with fabrics from the wash groups 1 and 2 should be washed on 2, similarly a wash load with fabrics from 3 and 4 should be washed on 4 etc. White nylon, Polyester/Cotton, and delicate items i.e. programmes 3, 4, 6, should be washed separately.

Make sure that all pockets have been emptied, zips fastened and apron strings tied. Remove pins and other small objects which could harm clothes if they become separated in the machine.

If possible make up loads of similar soiling keeping heavily soiled items separate from lightly soiled clothes. Heavily soiled areas such as shirt cuffs and collars may be pretreated by brushing with a solution of detergent and water; this should be applied lightly to the soiled side of the garment.

Before washing your coloured garments – check that the colours are fast!

Usually it is recommended that coloureds be washed separately from whites, but some fast dyed items i.e. sheets, towels can safely be washed together with your family household linen.

Non-fast coloured articles should always be washed at the recommended temperature.

### **STAINS**

### Stain Removal

Most household stains come out in the normal wash, but there are some which require special treatment. The following hints may help with common stains.

When using a stain remover or bleach follow the makers direction carefully. Never use full strength bleach on any fabrics.

Rinse thoroughly after any special treatment. Chemicals left in fabrics can weaken or destroy some fibres. Test fabrics for possible damage to fibres or colour before tackling the stained area.

Coffee, Tea,	
Fruit, Wine,	

These are usually removed in the wash. For old stains, soak in a biological wash product,

then launder in the usual way.

Grass, Ink, Ballpoint

Dab with methylated spirits over a soft cotton pad, then launder in the usual way.
Do not use methylated spirits on Tricel.

Treat ink stains on Tricel with glycerine.

Tar

Scrape off excess, dab with petrol

over a soft cotton pad. (Caution. Petrol is inflammable).

Scorch

Moisten light stains and soak in glycerine then wash. If stains remain, soak in one part hydrogen peroxide to nine parts water; wash through and rinse thoroughly.

Iron Mould

Soak light stains in lemon juice, press between

damp cotton, repeat if necessary.

Grease, Fat, Lipstick, Blood, Egg, Milk, Cream, Meat Juice Treat with a proprietary grease solvent. Soak in biological solution, then launder

in the usual way.

Mildew

Treat with peroxide. Soak (using one part hydrogen peroxide to nine parts water), rinse well. Care must be taken with coloured fabrics.

# Loading the Machine

When you have a large wash load made up of shirts, towels, pillowcases, pyjamas and other similar small items, place them loosely into the drum.

Large items like a candlewick bedspread for instance, should be washed individually.

When washing a mixed load, put medium and small items into the drum alternately. A sheet should be picked up by the centre, tentwise, shaken and then folded, pressing out the air.

# **Wash Programme**

The choice of programmes on your machine enables you to select the best programme for your wash load. The programmes on the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector correspond to the Care Labelling Code of the International Care Labelling Scheme. See the chart on page 11.

# **Bio Wash**

It could be that you have items of laundry which would benefit from a Bio-wash, e.g. blood, gravy, egg stains etc. Follow the above procedure, making sure that the low suds bio detergent goes into the detergent dispenser compartment 1. Select the required Programme and start the machine by pulling out the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector.

The machine will now automatically heat the water to 50°C approx. The correct temperature for the Bio-detergent to function.

The Biological wash and soak will take approximately 45 minutes, after which time your machine will stop. At this point the door may be opened and further garments added for the main wash. A main wash programme should then be selected.

### Pre-Wash

On heavily soiled wash loads a Pre-wash will help to obtain a better wash. It will disperse any superficial dirt and help loosen soil ready for the main wash.

It can be used in conjunction with most wash programmes - synthetics as well as natural fibres.

To obtain a Pre-wash, load the machine and

place the correct quantity (see page 9) of low suds detergent into both the Pre-wash (1) and Main wash (2) compartments of the detergent dispenser. Select the Pre-wash programme and start the machine by pulling out the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector. Once set, the machine will automatically heat the Pre-wash water to 40°C, pre-wash, drain spin and stop. The Pre-wash takes approx. 20 mins. A main wash programme should then be selected.

### Main Wash

To start the machine without a Bio-wash or Pre-wash ensure that the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector is turned to the desired programme (see chart on page 11) and that the correct quantity of low suds detergent is in the main wash compartment (2) of the detergent dispenser. Start the machine by pulling the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector.

# Pre-Fill

At the start of the Pre-wash/Bio-wash and Main wash the machine will pre-fill. This means that initially water will flow into the machine bypassing the soap dispenser. This will prevent loss of detergent into the sump.

# **Woollens Wash**

Your Bendix Autowasher has a programme for woollen articles which has been approved by the International Wool Secretariat for machine washable articles.

Turn the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector to 7 and press the wool/quick wash button. Don't wash woollens in your Bendix unless the garment has been labelled 'machine washable', which means that it has been especially treated to minimise shrinkage. It is advantageous however, to spin any woollen articles that have been washed and rinsed by hand as this removes most of the excess water.

After spinning, remove from the drum, pull into shape and dry flat avoiding direct heat. Always dry woollens carefully to help preserve their texture and shape.

Do not be tempted to put woollen garments into any tumble drier, as shrinkage and felting may result.

# **Quick Wash**

Programme 7 provides the facility for a quick 40 minute wash. Select the programme as above but do **not** press the wool button.

## Blankets

'Machine Blankets that are labelled Washable' can be safely washed on the Wool Programme 7 (40°C). Do not select an 'economy' programme. Most blanket manufacturers issue specific treatment for their products. Sometimes they will stipulate hand washing or dry cleaning. This particularly applies to wool cellular and honevcomb blankets which should not be machine washed.

# Rinsing

All wash cycles automatically include 3 rinses and the programmes for natural fibres go on to spin automatically at either 400 or 800 rpm. It is during the last of the 3 rinses that any additives like fabric softener are taken into the machine.

The 3 programmes for synthetics and delicate fabrics (see page 11) have a 'pause' feature, giving 3 rinses and then retaining the last rinsing water. This feature prevents excessive creasing. When you are ready to remove the clothes from the machine turn the Wash Timer Dial/Programme Selector to 'Spin' and the programme will be automatically completed.

# Spin

Items that have been hand washed can be rinsed and spun in your Bendix using the rinse and spin sections of the wash cycles. Select rinse 1 on the Wash Timer Dial/ Programme Selector for natural fibres and conditioner rinse for synthetic fibres. Pull the Dial out to start the machine

After approximately 2 minutes delay the door may be opened and the clothes removed.

# After Use - we recommend:

- 1. Turn off the hot and cold taps to the machine.
- 2. Make sure that the Wash Timer Dial/ Programme Selector is at the 'off' position. Push the Dial in.
- 3. Switch off at the power point.
- 4. Leave the porthole door slightly ajar to assist in drying out.
- 5. Ensure that the drain screen is clean, especially after washing nappies and towels. If this is not done regularly you may find your Bendix will not drain efficiently. Always remove and clean the drain screen when the machine is empty. Don't forget to replace the drain screen after cleaning. See page 7.
- 6. If your machine is not permanently installed, disconnect the hoses, remove the electric plug from the socket and coil up the cord.

# What's gone wrong?

If your machine won't work please check the following list and make sure that you haven't overlooked anything which might prevent your Bendix from functioning. It will help you and us.

Check that your Bendix is plugged in and switched on and that the indicator light comes on when a programme is selected and the knob has been pulled out to the on position.

- 1. Check the 13 amp fuse in the plug. You could try another appliance from the same socket in case the main fuse has blown.
- 2. Be sure that the hot and cold taps have been fully turned on.
- 3. Have you selected a Programme?.
- 4. Check to see that the door is fully closed. The door safety switch prevents the heater and motor operating if the door is open.
- 5. Is your machine overloaded? If so the motor protector switch will stop the motor. If overloading is the problem, remove some of the clothes but take care not to scald yourself in doing so.
- 6. Check that the drain and fill hoses are not kinked (this is a very common cause, particularly if the machine has been moved for any reason) and have been fitted correctly.
  - Does the drain screen need cleaning? See Page 7 but first drain off any water in the appliance.

If after checking all these points your machine still does not work contact your nearest Bendix Service Branch. See list on page 16. Or look under 'Bendix' in the telephone book.

**Note** If on making a service call, our engineer finds that the only attention required is to remedy one of the above conditions, a charge will be made whether the machine is in or out of the guarantee period, or under Service Contract.

# **Moving House**

If you plan to move, contact your authorised Bendix Serviceman to see what should be done before and during the moving of your machine, particularly in respect of refitting the transit bars.
